1	How does the school know if children need extra help and what should I do if I think my child may have special educational needs?	We rigorously track progress of all our learners and as professionals we regularly discuss any concerns we have as well as celebrate achievement. The robust tracking of progress is monitored regularly by class teachers and the Senior Leadership Team. We have systems in place to use data to support tracking at least termly. Pupils who are not making expected progress in a particular area are identified and the school then identifies the need for additional support in consultation with parents. Parents are encouraged to speak to the SENCO about any concerns they have and the school makes contact with parents if they have concerns also. All children in Year R are assessed against a baseline when they start in September and the teachers continually monitor their progress towards the Early Learning Goals. They also complete a language screener (NELI) that identifies any weaknesses in receptive and expressive language. This gives an indication of areas of difficulty which could affect learning in the future. Children who join the school at a different point (after Year R) complete a reading assessment on entry and the usual assessments during that term and class teachers speak to the SENCo if they have concerns about attainment and/or progress.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Tracking of progress• Benchmarking at start of Year R• Regular monitoring of progress by Class Teachers• Termly Progress meetings• Open door policy for parents• Provision mapping of needs across the school

2	How will school staff support my child?	Your child's class teacher will oversee and plan every child's work to ensure that progress is made in every area of the curriculum. We are continually looking at how we can improve the learning environment for all our children and we appreciate that every child approaches learning differently. It may be decided that your child needs additional support (sometimes called SEN Support) to access the curriculum fully or to make the desired rate of progress. This may take place within the classroom setting or elsewhere in the school. Sometimes this is for a small group of children and sometimes a child receives individual help from a teacher or Learning Support Assistant (LSA). This may be for a short period of time to enable them to catch up or if this is not enough we will develop a longer term plan for them. We try to minimise the amount of time a child is removed from the classroom. We have a range of published resources to support classroom learning. Speech and Language resources are obtained from the Southern Health NHS Speech and Language Therapy Department as required. This additional support is overseen by the SENCo who will monitor progress and give support to those working with these children. One of the School's governors has responsibility for SEN. If your child has a medical condition which might affect their learning or participation, they will have a Health Care Plan so that staff will know how to help them. 3	How will the curriculum be matched to my child's needs?	We use a creative and varied approach to the curriculum which means that every child is given challenges appropriate to their learning goals. 4	How will I know how my child is doing and how will you help me to support my	Learner feedback is part of our established learning culture. This includes working with families to develop their child's next steps and what they can do to help/support their child's learning through termly meetings. If your child is receiving additional or different support from their peers, they will usually have an Individual Education Plan which shows the area in which they are receiving additional help and the steps taken towards their desired outcomes. This is agreed with the parents. The progress of every child is regularly reviewed by the class teacher against short-term targets in their intervention and when targets are reached new targets are set. 	child's learning?	every child with a special educational need are invited to a termly meeting to review progress. This may be as part of the regular parents' meetings with the class teacher in the Autumn and Spring terms. Parents will be offered an additional review meeting towards the end of the summer term. If you have concerns between these times then you can ask for an appointment to see the class teacher or the SENCo. If your child has an Individual Education Plan, you will be given a copy so you can help them achieve their targets. There are lots of ways that every parent can support their child at home. All children have a reading book which they can share with you. As they progress through the school they will have spellings and number facts to learn and then Maths and Literacy homework which they may need help with, and they will appreciate you showing an interest in what they are doing. All children also have a home learning task twice a term which is an opportunity for you to help them further.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Valuing the contribution of parents
5	What support will there be for my child's overall well-being?	The class teacher has the overall responsibility for the care of every child in their class. In case of an accident, illness or need for medication, there are several members of staff trained in first aid and the child will usually be taken to the school office. Children will only be administered with medication for which a parent has completed the school's consent form. Each class has a nominated Learning Support Assistant who is able to assist children with a range of emotional needs. All children follow the SCARF scheme, our Relationships and Health programme, which helps to create a positive mental wellbeing culture in which children build resilience and self-esteem. The curriculum covers aspects of mental health and helps children understand their feelings and emotions. We have trained staff who complete interventions in emotional literacy, therapeutic active listening and social skills. If you have a concern about your child's well-being, for which you think they need additional support, then please speak to the class teacher, Deputy Head or the SENCo. Our Positive Behaviour Policy; which includes clear guidance on expectations, rewards and sanctions is fully understood and in place by all staff. 6	What specialist services and expertise are available at or accessed by the school?	We have access to the Hampshire Educational Psychology Service and outreach workers from local special schools, who can assess a child's needs and offer advice on how to overcome barriers to learning. We can contact voluntary organisations who can provide advice and training in particular areas. For children learning English as an Additional Language, we can contact Hampshire EMTAS who have specialist resources and will provide advice, guidance and training for parents and staff. We also work with other external agencies to which a child has been referred such as the Mental Health Support Team, speech and language therapists, occupational therapists, health agencies or social workers.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Link with outside agencies and services • Signpost staff to possible training opportunities

7	What training are the staff supporting children with SEND had or are having?	Our Special Needs Co-ordinator (SENCo) has completed the mandatory post graduate National Award for Special Educational Needs Co-ordination Award and is a qualified teacher. Some of our support staff have received specific training to support children with Speech and Language and Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs. Continued Professional Development for all staff looks at current needs and strengths and training is tailored accordingly. All teachers and support staff receive training from time to time on issues affecting children with additional needs either in school or by attending courses run by outside agencies.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • SENCo completed SEN award and holds QTS status • Regular staff meetings • Training offered to all staff • Emotional Literacy and Active Listening Assistant Support
8	How will my child be included in activities outside the classroom including school trips?	We aim to include all children in all aspects of the curriculum. Where necessary we consult with parents when planning activities outside the classroom, particularly if this may affect the participation of their child. Risk assessments are completed and checked for every activity outside the classroom. Where there are concerns of safety and access, further thought and consideration is put in place to ensure needs are met. Where necessary an additional adult will accompany a school trip to ensure the safety and participation of children with additional needs.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Risk assessments completed • Communication of trips by letter to all parents • Individual consultation with parents as and when required.
9	How accessible is the school environment?	Our school is wheelchair accessible via the front entrance and has a large disabled toilet. Should any pupil become disabled or any disabled pupil join the school, then professional advice will be sought and action taken to provide any necessary aids to assist them to gain full access to the curriculum and all aspects of school life. Please see our Accessibility Policy for more details. 10	How will the school prepare my child for joining the school and transferring to a new school?	<p>If your child is joining us in September in Year R (Reception) the class teacher and a Learning Support Assistant will usually visit you at home and meet your child at their pre-school if they attend one. In the summer term we have several opportunities for them to spend time in school getting to know their new environment. At the start of the first term, they will have a gradual introduction in the first few weeks.</p> <p>If your child joins us from another school we would ask you to provide us with as much information as soon as possible so that we can make the transition smooth for them and provide them with additional support if required. We encourage them to visit their new class prior to starting at St Mark's and, if needed, they can have a gradual induction.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Transition programme in place for entry to Year R and exit to Year 7 • SENCO meets with SENCO's of transition schools/nurseries to discuss relevant information and pass on details.

		<p>We encourage you to take your child to visit the school(s) they are applying to so they are involved in the process. We will attempt to contact the new school to share significant information and will pass on all relevant records to enable continuity.</p> <p>When children leave at the end of year 6 we meet with the key staff at their new school to share information. Most secondary schools will arrange a series of transition visits during the summer term for those with SEN to help them familiarise themselves with the new environment and key staff.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Positive relationships with feeder settings • Home visits to all new Year R children • In-house transition between classes • Additional transition to KS3 for vulnerable children and children new to the school.
11	How are school's resources allocated and matched to children's special educational needs?	<p>The school is given a notional SEND budget. The money is used to provide additional support or resources dependent on an individuals' needs.</p> <p>Support can take many forms and our guiding principle is providing the highest quality education for all children. To this end, we ensure that classes have time from an allocated Learning Support Assistant to support the children. We distribute time from Learning Support Assistants based on the pupil need in the cohort. We want the best for our pupils just as you want the best for your child.</p> <p>Support may include (but is not restricted to):</p> <p>Adaptations/accommodations to increase access to text (desk copies of information to aid tracking difficulties, accessible text, different recording strategies, additional time etc.)</p> <p>In class, adult support/mediation aimed at increasing skills in specific area of weakness (learning behaviours, organisation, etc.)</p> <p>Out of class support with relationship building, social, emotional literacy development</p> <p>Small group intervention to pre-teach skills or enable children to 'catch up' (subject or targeted at additional need)</p> <p>One to one teaching to target specific areas of need</p> <p>Additional teaching resources or practical apparatus to support learning</p> <p>Accessing additional support and advice from specialists.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provision mapping • Evaluation of interventions • SENCO and HT meet regularly • SENCO and CT's meet regularly • Timetabled interventions led by LSA's • Specific Interventions planned by CT with SENCO support where required.
12	How is the decision made about	<p>We will inform parents if we identify an area of concern and discuss what we aim to put in place. If parents have a concern then we will decide with them what steps can be taken. We will invite parents to meet with us at least once a term to discuss progress. 	<p>what type and how much support my child will receive?</p> <p>How will parents know if support has had an impact?</p>	<p>on a programme of support that aims to meet the identified need. If any approach is not successful then the support is reconsidered and a different approach is tried. If we need further support or advice then we can consult with the Hampshire Educational Psychologist Team or another outside agency, with the parent's approval.</p> <p>The SENCO will support your child's Class Teacher in writing additional targets for your child that specify the targets set for your child to achieve.</p> <p>We regularly review the children's progress against their targets from their Individual Education Plan and give verbal feedback about the progress. We measure whether the child is making accelerated progress towards National, age-related expectations and that the gap between themselves and their peers is narrowing. Interventions will be phased out when children have made sufficient progress, but they will continue to be monitored.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • SENCO facilitates outside agency support where appropriate • CT initiates IEP for children with SEND
